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Dr. Ricardo Flores Leader in the Fight Against Childhood Cancer

Dr. Ricardo Flores, MD Leader in the Fight Against Childhood Cancer

He works with a sense of humanity, music, and laughter to provide the best care for affected children.

WoodlanStories Magazine recently met with the distinguished oncologist Dr. Ricardo Flores, who leads the Hematology-Oncology department at Texas Children's Hospital in The Woodlands. He is the first Puerto Rican to hold such an important position at one of the world's most renowned hospitals.

At the hospital, he works with a human touch, music, and laughter to provide the best care to children affected by leukemia.

In the United States, leukemia is the most common cancer among children and adolescents under 19. In Latin America and the Caribbean, nearly 30,000 cases of leukemia are diagnosed each year.

The Impact of Technology and Research in the Fight Against Childhood Cancer

"I came to the United States in 2007 after completing my training in Puerto Rico, and here in Texas, I found a fertile ground to continue my professional development in pediatric oncology and hematology." According to Dr. Flores, one reason childhood cancer is on the rise is due to advancements in technology and improvements in diagnostics. Technology has enabled earlier and more accurate detection, which has led to the identification of more cases of cancer in children that were previously undiagnosed.

Despite the rise in childhood cancer incidence, the mortality rate continues to decrease. Dr. Flores highlights that currently, more than 80% of children diagnosed with cancer survive, though there is still much work to be done.

Most Common Types of Cancer in Children

Among the most common types of cancer in children, Dr. Flores mentions leukemia, brain tumors, and lymphomas. Acute lymphoblastic leukemia (ALL) and acute myeloid leukemia are the most common, followed by brain tumors and lymphomas. While new, rarer types of cancer have emerged, medicine continues to advance in offering more effective and targeted treatments.

This is why the hospital offers a variety of resources, from animal therapy to family events, to help alleviate stress and foster a positive environment during treatment.

Music and Magic as Tools for Emotional Healing

Dr. Flores is also known for his unique approach to interacting with children through **magic and music**. Volunteering and Community Support: The Strength of the Hispanic Community

One of Dr. Flores's most notable characteristics is his dedication to volunteering and his collaboration with the community. In 2017, Dr. Flores joined baseball player Carlos Correa to create a foundation that supports children with cancer. The foundation has raised more than \$6 million in supplies and medications and organizes events that allow children to enjoy unique experiences, such as attending baseball games. The Hispanic community in Houston plays a crucial role in this support, coming together for fundraising events and offering their time and resources.





The Future of Childhood Cancer Treatment

Regarding the future of cancer treatment, Dr. Flores is optimistic. "We are advancing toward more specific treatments, such as immunotherapy, which directly target cancer without damaging other cells in the body." Additionally, the advancements in technology and research in Houston are positioning the city as a leader in childhood cancer treatment and cure.

A Message for Parents Facing a Childhood Cancer Diagnosis

For parents who receive a cancer diagnosis for their children, Dr. Flores sends a message of hope: "Today, the vast majority of children diagnosed with cancer survive, and we must face this battle together, knowing that medicine is making giant strides."

Where Do Jour Roses Come From?

G lobally, the **floral market** is expected to reach a value of nearly **\$55 billion**, with peak consumption dates such as Valentine's Day representing a significant portion of that revenue. While some countries are large consumers (the U.S., the Netherlands, the United Kingdom), most of the flowers for this occasion are produced in exporting countries like **Colombia**, **Ecuador**, **and Kenya**. Valentine's Day consumption in the U.S. is expected to continue increasing, with the total flower market potentially surpassing **\$21 billion** by 2025. The most in-demand flowers will remain **red roses**, followed by **lilies and orchids**.



COLOMBIA

Flower production, particularly roses, is expected to reach \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion in exports.



ECUADOR

Exports may exceed \$1.2 billion, primarily in red roses.



KENYA

Exports, especially to Europe, are expected to reach around \$1.1 billion by 2025, focusing on roses and lilies.

As both a producer and exporter, Mexico is projected to generate approximately \$1.8 billion in floral production, especially of roses, carnations, and gerberas


I Want to Be Your Kidney Donor

WoodlandStories Magazine presents this inspiring story, full of courage, faith, and hope. Juan Guillermo Hurtado (Memo) and his wife, María Isabel Quintero, have endured a very challenging journey, but today, they share with us a life-affirming and inspiring message.

"My story is not just mine; it's the story of my entire family," explains Memo, referring to the obstacles he has faced throughout his life, such as dialysis, heart attacks, and cancer. But his testimony is even more remarkable because behind it all lies his fight for a kidney transplant. In the United States, more than 90,000 people are waiting for a kidney donation, with only 5,000 about to 6,000 transplants performed annually. But what makes Memo's story truly striking is the turn his life took when a brave stranger decided to donate a kidney to save his life.

The Unexpected Gift of a Brave American

"I had to be on dialysis for three years without kidneys. I couldn't urinate, eat, or sleep properly. And all of that, without knowing if I would ever find a donor," Memo shares. It was in a moment of despair that the father of a classmate from his daughters' school found out about his situation and decided to perform an incredible act of kindness: to donate a kidney, even though they had never met, demonstrating that true acts of love and generosity have no boundaries.

"This American man didn't know me, and yet he decided to give me his kidney. He told me it was an easy decision because he wanted to make a difference in someone's life. His family supported him, and his love for his daughter was so great that they didn't hesitate to save another family,"

This story not only speaks of a generous donor but also highlights the importance of **awareness about organ donation**. "Wany don't know that they can donate while alive, like a kidney or a liver. It's essential that people inform themselves and realize that with a simple act, they can save lives," says María Isabel.

God Has Given Me Peace

Despite the challenges, Memo continues his fight. During the transplant process, his body had to adapt to the new kidney, receiving immunosuppressive medication to prevent rejection. 'It's a difficult process, but nothing compared to what I went through during dialysis. Rejection is a possibility, and my body needs time to accept the organ. Every day is a battle, but I'm no longer alone."

"God has given me this peace," Memo says with a serene gaze. He and his family have gone through moments of uncertainty and pain, but also moments of reconciliation and hope. "IVy wife has been my rock, my daughters have learned to value life and never give up, and now we are closer than ever."

Memo and María Isabel's journey is a testament to faith, perseverance, and the power of human solidarity. They are committed to sharing their story to inspire others to never give up, to never lose hope, and to always give their best.

Survival, Faith, and Music: The Story of Rafael Rubiano

"You have one year to live." These words forever changed the life of Rafael Rubiano. A young man, full of dreams, who never imagined that at 38 years old he would have to face a stage 4 brain cancer. What seemed like an arm pain turned into the nightmare that would lead him to an emergency surgery, where doctors gave him little chance of surviving. Despite this, Rafael's story is far from a tragedy; it is a testimony of faith, strength, and overcoming adversity.

Stage 4 brain cancer, also known as glioblastoma multiforme (GBM), is one of the most aggressive types of brain cancer. This type of tumor originates in the glial cells (the brain's supporting cells) and is characterized by rapid growth and its tendency to extensively invade other areas of the brain. It is very difficult to treat due to its aggressiveness and the way it spreads, making it a cancer with a **very poor prognosis**.

"My Wife Was Brave"

Rafael began to feel strange symptoms while playing the piano, his greatest passion. "I felt a cramp in my left arm, but I didn't pay attention to it," he recalls. However, the situation quickly worsened. "I forgot about my arm, I couldn't speak... My wife helped me put on my pajamas and rushed me to the hospital." After several tests, doctors discovered a brain hemorrhage, and immediately, surgery was scheduled. "They told me there was no hope." At that moment, Rafael faced what many fear: death. But he did not give up. His family, especially his wife, became his rock. 'IVIy wife was brave, she took care of me, helped me bathe, dress, and even cared for me while I was completely immobilized." In the midst of this painful process, with a baby just 5 months old, Rafael asked God for the opportunity to stay alive: "I won't see my little son grow...," he lamented.

After **30** sessions of radiotherapy, which left his body weak, Rafael suffered a pulmonary infarction. Although doctors thought his cancer had metastasized, they soon realized that the issue was something else. However, recovery was arduous. He was told he would never walk again, that his life would never be the same. But Rafael's faith and dedication to his family kept him fighting.



Declared a Cancer Survivor

Despite being declared a "**terminal case**" by doctors, Rafael watched as, little by little, his body began to heal. **Five years later, he was declared** a cancer survivor. The doctors couldn't believe it, but he had a clear explanation: "God healed me, and my life is a miracle."

Today, Rafael continues moving forward, not only with music but also with a deep desire to share his testimony. "Every day is a miracle. I thank God for every breath," he says. His family, his three children, and his wife remain his greatest strength. "If I hadn't had a solid relationship with my wife, it wouldn't have been possible to survive this."

Rafael has turned his pain into **inspiration**. Not only does he teach music, but he also gives **lessons in piano**, **guitar**, **drums**, **and other instruments** to people of all ages, from young children to the elderly. His passion for music knows no bounds, and he continues to be a testament to how, with faith, anything is possible.

"With God, everything is possible," Rafael repeats, as he continues to play his instruments and share his story. His life is a clear reminder that, even when everything seems lost, faith, love, and determination can change one's destiny.

Human traffic Aymés Cervantes:

A Story of Resilience and Hope in the Face of Human Trafficking in Houston

Texas has been identified as one of the states with the highest rates of human trafficking in the United States, according to the National Human Trafficking Hotline. Houston stands out as a hub for human trafficking due to its geographical location, proximity to the Mexican border, and its importance as a key port for trade and transportation. The Texas Department of Justice has documented over 2,000 cases of sex trafficking victims in the city in recent years, and the numbers continue to rise. Despite these alarming statistics, human trafficking remains a crime that is difficult to accurately measure, as many cases are never reported.

Aymés Cervantes, a young Mexican woman, has been a victim of human trafficking in Houston. **WoodlandStories Magazine spoke with her.** Her story, heartbreaking and filled with pain, is also a testimony of resilience and overcoming adversity. After living through a traumatic experience for more than four months, she has now become a key voice to alert others about the reality of this crime.

"I never suspected anything. I thought I was taking a normal job, but I was wrong," she tells us, recalling how a simple job offer turned into her nightmare. Aymés, like many others, fell victim to a trafficking network by trusting an apparently legitimate job offer. "What human trafficking networks do is study your life, your vulnerabilities, and take advantage of them," she says with a serious look, remembering how her financial need led her to accept a job that, unknowingly, would trap her in both psychological and physical captivity.

"I saw the ad, went to the interview, they told me I would be taking care of children, and I never suspected anything unusual. It wasn't until they took me to a different house than the one, they had told me that I started to realize something was wrong," she narrates, recalling the moment when she realized that something was amiss. At that point, Aymés lost all autonomy, and her life became a living hell.

"It's like being in a prison, but not a physical one; it's an emotional prison. You can no longer think for yourself, nor decide about your life or your body," she explains, her voice breaking as she recalls the darkest moments of her captivity.

During her time under the oppression of her captors, Aymés was subjected to indescribable situations. "They forced me to attend to up to 10 clients a day. If you got sick, they wouldn't let you rest; you couldn't do anything against their will." Amid all this, she was threatened with death, and her family, thousands of miles away, was used as a tool of pressure.

'One of the ways they control you is through threats. They say, 'We know where your family is, we know you have children,' and that makes you feel completely vulnerable. You no longer have control over anything," she shares, as she relieves the intense psychological threats she was subjected to.

The situation worsened when Aymés discovered she was pregnant "They told me I had to abort, but also that I had to keep working. Not only did they make me feel like an object, but they also denied me any rights over my body." This new emotional reality was a devastating blow for her, already struggling with her captivity. However, amidst so much suffering, "They forced me to attend to up to 10 elients a day. If you got siek, they wouldn't let you rest; you couldn't do anything against their will."



"that baby, whom I named Gabriel, was the angel who gave me the strength to move forward and escape."

Aymés never gave up. 'Ny mind alvvays told me I had to escape, even though I didn't know how or when, but one day I would make it," she recalls, her face reflecting the determination with which she fought to regain her freedom.

The escape happened at the most unexpected moment After receiving medical attention, she was given the opportunity to return to her "home," but **"that was my chance. During the transfer, I asked for help from a volunteer and managed to escape,** leaving the terror behind."

"This testimony is not just for women, but also for men and families. No one is exempt from being a victim of human trafficking. What happened to me can happen to anyone, no matter your social level or education," she assures, issuing an urgent warning to everyone who thinks this reality only happens to others.

"If we don't pay attention to the signs, if we don't educate our children and ourselves about the dangers that exist, we're leaving the door open for trafficking networks," she adds.

Aymés also calls out to those who consume pornography or sexual services. 'Every time you pay for these services, you may be indirectly contributing to human trafficking. Not everything that seems like a legitimate business is."

"The healing process has been long. I've had to learn to forgive myself and redefine my life. My daughter gave me the strength to do so. Today I can say that I am a survivor, not a victim," she concludes, showing herself firm and optimistic about her future. "There is something bigger than all of this: faith. Faith in God and in ourselves. Faith gives us the strength to move forward, no matter how difficult the road may be."

"The message is clear: we can all overcome any difficult situation. But we must be alert because we are all vulnerable. If there's one thing I've learned, it's that human trafficking is real, it's happening, and it's closer than we imagine," she ends with determination.

Aymés Cervantes' testimony is an urgent call to reflect on the reality of human trafficking, to educate our families, and to stay vigilant against this devastating crime.

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Armando Anguiano: The Vision to Plant 100 Churches

In the northern part of The Woodlands, Texas, a faith community is witnessing an inspiring story. Pastor Armando, together with his wife Sara, has embarked on an ambitious project to plant 100 Hispanic churches in the coming years. This vision comes from a generous heart, guided by the belief that the Gospel can bring purpose and transformation to the lives of many people.

"How about 100 churches?" Armando asks. The answer is clear: in a region where 40% of the population is Hispanic, the spiritual challenge is greater than many imagine. With the growth of the Hispanic community, it is expected that by 2030, up to 90% of the population will speak Spanish. This scenario has driven the church to act with urgency and seek the spiritual well-being of a community that, for the most part, faces challenges in adaptation and acceptance.

The Impact of the Hispanic Community

Armando is 55 years old and, together with his family, has made the United States his home for the past 12 years. Before coming to Texas, he had apparent success in Mexico, but he felt the need for a space to reconnect with his family and seek spiritual direction. "The primary idea was to come to this wonderful place so that my children could improve their language skills and so that I could pray and seek G od," he shares.

The call to be a pastor is something beyond a personal choice. According to Armando, "The work of a pastor has more to do with the gifts and purpose for which you were created than with something you choose out of preference." This calling becomes even more relevant in a context like the United S tates, where the growth of the Hispanic community is undeniable. The contribution of Latinos is key not only for the economy but also for the social and spiritual development of this nation.

Spiritual Challenges and the Importance of Spirit Care

One of the major challenges the church faces today is the disenchantment some feel toward the spiritual realm, especially in such a fast-paced and materialistic world. Technology, social media, and the constant pursuit of the physical and external have led many to neglect what truly matters: the care of the spirit

"The world has changed a lot We focus on the exterior, on the body, and on emotions, but we forget that we are also a spirit," reflects Armando. "Just as we exercise to care for our bodies, we must also be intentional about caring for our spirit. My challenge for you is: what are you doing today to care for your spirit?"

Comparing spiritual life to physical training, Armando makes a powerful analogy: "When you go to a gym, you can be disciplined, but if you don't follow the instructions of an experienced coach,



your efforts won't be as effective. The same happens with spiritual life. We need the guidance of someone who knows the way."

The Legacy of Rick Warren and the Humility of a Leader

Throughout his journey, Armando has had the opportunity to work with international figures like Rick Warren, a Christian leader known worldwide. For him, the most impactful aspect of Warren is his humility. "It's impressive to see how someone with so much influence continues to demonstrate a humble heart full of love for others," says Armando.

The Reality of Being a Pastor: A Calling with a High Price

Being a pastor is not easy, especially when people expect you to have all the answers. "Pastors are human, we have challenges, we suffer, and we go through times of pain and depression," says Armando. A pastor's daily life can be emotionally exhausting, as preaching a message is like running a half marathon in terms of energy. However, the key to enduring these challenges is maintaining a genuine relationship with G od.

"What really makes the difference is knowing G od in a real way. When you do, no matter what you face, there is always hope," Armando concludes.

A Message for Hispanics: Contributing to the Future of a Nation

For Hispanics coming to the United States, Armando has a clear message: "This country has been a fertile ground for many, and it's exciting to see how the Hispanic community is contributing with effort and dedication. Here, it's not about seeing ourselves as inferior or superior, but recognizing that we all have the same opportunities and the same potential."

The Call to Not Live in Mediocrity

With 50 years of life experience and reflection, Armando closes the interview by sharing something that deeply angers him: "Mediocrity. I can't stand seeing people limit themselves, how they believe they can't achieve more, how they settle for living a life that doesn't reflect their true potential."

This message of hope, challenge, and action is what drives Armando and his church to continue pursuing their vision of planting 100 Hispanic churches. It is a project that aims not to elevate names but to transform lives and bless the community with the purposeful message the G ospel brings.

Self-Love and Identity: The Key to Your Career

Not What, but Who

Withjust a fewing edients, this soup becomes a comforting and loving dish, perfect for sharing with those you love most.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1/2 kilo of pumpkin
- 1 onion
- 1/4 kilo of carrots
- 2 tablespoons of olive oil
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon of salt
- 1/2 liter of broth (any kind you prefer)
- 1/2 cup of heavy cream
- 1/4 teaspoon of freshly ground black pepper
- Fresh cilantro to taste

PREPARATION:

- 1. Peel and cut the pumpkin into cubes. Dice the onion and carrots.
- 2. In a pot, heat a little olive oil over low heat and add the onion. C ook until it becomes translucent, about 5 minutes.
- 3. Add the carrots and cook for an additional 15 minutes.
- 4. Add the pumpkin, bay leaf, and broth (adjust the amount to your taste).
- 5. Cook over medium heat, partially covering the pot, for about 30 minutes, until the vegetables are tender.
- 6. Blend the mixture with fresh cilantro to taste.

7. Return the soup to the heat for about 5 minutes, adding the heavy cream to fully incorporate it.

8.S eason with freshly ground black pepper and adjust the salt as needed.

And there you have it! Serve this delicious soup with all the love it deserves. Enjoy!
